




REFLECTIONS FROM THE PRESIDENT

NEXT PHASE OF THOROFARE CANAL PROPERTY IMPROVEMENT PROJECT COMPLETED by Doug Thiel

In June, the Conservancy was approached by Jack Adams, who lives on Grosse and is a member of Boy Scout Troop 1659 in Riverview. He was interested in pursuing an Eagle Scout project and wondered if there were any possible projects that the Conservancy had available.

The timing was perfect, as we were ready to work on the next phase of the Thorofare Canal Property Improvement Project which involved the rehabilitation of the shoreline bordering the Thorofare Canal.

Our summer newsletter reviewed Phase I of the project. The shoreline was strewn with concrete pieces, cinder blocks, broken bricks and other man-made debris. The vegetation along the shoreline was a mass of poison ivy and other unattractive plants. After visiting the site with Jack and reviewing the scope of the project, he was very excited about working on it. He reviewed the project with his troop leaders and was given the necessary approval

to proceed.

Jack drew up a detailed plan after consulting with Lisa Appel (a Naturalist who consults with GINLC), who developed the overall site improvement plan. The plan was approved by GINLC and the work was completed during August, September and October. The man-made debris was replaced with natural rock, and a variety of native species were planted along the shoreline in a

mulched bed. A key feature of the improved shoreline is a wildlife ramp to allow movement by various animal species from the water onto the land. Most of the shoreline along the canal in this area is lined with break walls which inhibits the movement of wildlife. The completed project has resulted in a much more aesthetically pleasing and wildlife friendly shoreline.

The Conservancy salutes Jack on a project well done!

JOSH SHAH'S EAGLE SCOUT PROJECT

Eagle Scout candidate Josh Shah approached the Conservancy this spring asking for assistance in completing his project of identifying the locations of the largest specimens of trees native to Grosse Ile. His project was the idea of Yi-Chia Schmaeman. Josh located the largest specimens of various trees and developed a brochure that lists the trees, with a brief description and GPS location of each. These brochures are available at the Township Hall and through the Conservancy. In the field, the trees are identified with a metal pole to which a laminated summary sheet is attached which describes the features of the trees and their various uses by wildlife and man.

This project was completed under the guidance of Pamela Frucci, with technical and financial support from the Conservancy and the help of other scouts from Josh's troop. This is an excellent educational tool for residents who would like to learn about the various tree species on Grosse Ile.

On August 6, GINLC hosted 35 students and teachers at the Gibraltar Bay Unit of the International Wildlife Refuge. They ranged from 3rd graders to high school students and spent the time participating in nature studies. A tour was given by naturalist Natalie Ray and learning stations were set up by Grosse Ile Animal Control Officer Julie Cortis, Jamie Lanier of the Fish and Wildlife Service (water pollution game) and nature photos by Karen Skrocki.

Many thanks to GINLC members and the Grosse Ile Rotary who provided support and assistance. It was a great morning for all.

Others spent their time with heavy brush trimmers clearing the path down to the observation deck situated at the marsh pond located on the West side of the roadway about midway between the parking lot and the old seaplane base. Later joined by the painters, the clearing made it possible to again see the pond from the deck.

Somehow, as hot as it was that day, there was still energy to clear out the growth in front of two benches located on the East side of the road and overlooking Gibraltar Bay and a portion of the lotus beds (see before and after pictures below). The benches were used frequently during the following month when visitors came from all over Southeast Michigan to see and photograph the American Lotus.

July 21 was the clean-up date for the GBU. Board members were joined by volunteers for the project.

Everyone split up, with some spending their time putting the second coat of paint on the shed that had been provided by the US Fish and Wildlife group. It is anticipated, hopefully, that further painting will not be required for a minimum of 5 - 8 years. A great job was done, even though the tedious job of painting the grooves had to be done using a brush.
